MR WHITLAM: ⁴⁸((The main)) issue, almost the **sole** issue, of this campaign, will be.. **whether**.. the **government** which the.. people **elect**, with a **majority** in the House of Representatives, will be allowed to govern. from now on. ⁴⁹The **whole** of this system.. is under challenge, as we see. ⁵⁰Now, up till the very last division, in the House of Representatives, it was **plain**.. that **my** government.. had.. a majority in the House of Representatives, where, we've **always** believed, governments should be made, and unmade. ⁵¹We won that division by.. a majority of ten votes: sixty-four for us, fifty-four for the others. ⁵²And uh, during this campaign, the overwhelming issue will be.. 'Are we to have.. three-year governments in Australia? Is the party, which gets a majority in the House of Representatives, to be allowed to govern.' ⁵³That is, it's the future.. of **parliamentary** democracy as we have known it.

REPORTER 2: ⁵⁴– er.. the Governor-General has *stated* that the reason for *dismissing* you is that you no longer have *Supply*, and cannot *govern*. ⁵⁵At any *stage* did *he tell* you along the way that ah.. he would *dismiss* you before Supply ran out on.. November *thirty*; in other words tell you that if you wanted to have a Half-Senate you *ought* to have it.. have it *done* by the.. November *thirty*..

MR WHITLAM: ⁵⁶No; no, that was **not** the advice that.. I gave to the Governor-General nor was it the.. er.. 'im**press**ion' that the Governor-General gave me. ⁵⁷ Supply had **not** run out, by the time I saw the Governor-General.. at one o'clock today, .. er and uh as we all **know**, about a quarter past **two** this afternoon.. the Budget bills were **passed**; and when Mr Fraser.. read.. portions.. of Sir John Kerr's.. 'views', to the House of Representatives, those views were.. no **longer**.. 'well-based', because, by **that** time, Supply.. had been **passed**, the **Budget** bills.. had been **passed**.

REPORTER 3: ⁵⁸Are you saying that at.. **no** stage in the talks you had with the Governor-General. did he.. give-leave you with an impression that.. he thought that a General Election was mm.. the proper course.

MR WHITLAM: ⁵⁹On the contrary; he gave me the.. **other** impression. ⁶⁰He he knew that.. I had and ah.. was likely.. to **continue** to have.. a majority.. in the House of Representatives, and he also **knew** of course that.. the Opposition.. **didn't** have a majority in the Senate.

REPORTER 4: ⁶¹Are you saying, Mr Whitlam he misled you? REPORTER 5: ⁶²((Did you attempt to)) get in touch with

MR WHITLAM: mm?

REPORTER 5: with Buckingham Palace or with.. London about the actions of the Governor-General?

MR WHITLAM: ⁶³The Governor-General.. **prevented** me in getting in touch with the *Queen* by.. just withdrawing m' commision.. **immediately**. ⁶⁴ I was.. **unable**.. to communicate.. er with the Queen, as I would have been **entitled** to do.. er if I'd had any **warning** of the course.. that he, the Governor-General, er.. was to take.

REPORTER 6: ⁶⁵Do you believe the Queen knew about this course of action?, that the Governor-General-

MR WHITLAM: ⁶⁶I shouldn't bel- I shouldn't **think** so but I don't **know**.
